

Military pay commission poised to issue recommendations

Military advocacy groups, many of which are SaveOurBenefit valued associates, strongly oppose reducing benefits that troops and their families have been promised and earned, especially after a decade of war and repeated deployments.

According to a Commission spokesperson, the panel has identified a number of efficiencies. Rather than cutting benefits, the Commission was focused on making them more efficient, modern and valuable to service members and their families. The commission's recommendations will be submitted to the President and Congress no later than Feb. 1, and will be made available to the public at the same time.

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In 2015, Army will lose nearly 20,000 soldiers in drawdown Army Times

The Army stands to lose 18,200 soldiers in the drawdown plan for 2015, through attrition and reduced accessions, but also with retention screening boards that may lead to soldiers being forced out.

Initially the Army was poised to end the cuts at 490,000 in 2018, but sequestration and related budgetary pressures have moved up that target to Sept. 30, 2015. If sequestration stays in effect, the Army will have to cut an additional 40,000 in 2016 and 2017. SaveOurBenefit valued associates continue to urge Congress to end sequestration now!

After 13 years of combat operations, Operation Enduring Freedom drew to a close on Dec. 28, 2014 in a ceremony at the International Security and Assistance Force headquarters in Kabul, Afghanistan.

"For more than 13 years, ever since nearly 3,000 innocent lives were taken from us on 9/11, our nation has been at war in Afghanistan," Obama said. "Now, thanks to the extraordinary sacrifices of our men and women in uniform, our combat mission in Afghanistan is ending, and the longest war in American history is coming to a responsible conclusion."

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
